WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION

Maundy Thursday begins the Three Days (or Triduum), remembering the new commandment that Christ gave us in word and deed as he taught us how to love one another, washing our feet as a servant. We also celebrate the Lord's Supper, remembering the meal Christ shared with his disciples before his death. Historically, this was the traditional day in which those who had undergone a period of public penance under church discipline would be restored to full communion.

The name is taken from the first words sung at the ceremony of the washing of the feet, "I give you a new commandment" (John 13:34); also from the commandment of Christ that we should imitate his loving humility in the washing of the feet (John 13:14-17). The term mandatum (maundy), therefore, was applied to the rite of the foot washing on this day.

The opening service of the Triduum is not inherently mournful. The penitential acts of Maundy Thursday have celebratory aspects as well: restoration through the bold declaration of pardon; the act of foot washing connoting humility and intimacy; the celebration of the Lord's Supper embodying the mystery of Christ's enduring redemptive presence.

We Gather Megan Klose

Leader: This is a day of remembrance for us. In the growing darkness we gather. Our Lenten journey brought us here. Jesus, our Teacher and Lord, sets before us: a towel, a bowl, bread, and a cup.

People: Jesus gave us a new commandment, that we love one another, as he has loved us.

Leader: This is how everyone will know we are his disciples, when we love each other.

People: Obeying his commandment, we gather to break bread and share the cup of salvation sealed in his blood; proclaiming the Lord's death until he comes again.

Leader: This is a day of remembrance for us. Let us worship the Lord.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Leader: Our hearts are a battleground between faithfulness and betrayal. We are weak, but he is steadfast. Trusting in the unwavering love of Jesus Christ, who has delivered us from sin and death, let us confess our sin.

People: Lord Jesus Christ, how well you know our hearts, and still you love us – you have loved us to the end.

Leader: We have denied you,

People: and we have denied our calling to serve one another.

Leader: We have betrayed you,

People: and we have betrayed your commandment to love one another.

Leader: Pour out your Spirit of grace upon us.

People: Teach us to love and serve you faithfully and to love and serve one another by the example you have set for us; in your holy name we pray. Amen.

ASSURANCE OF PARDON

Leader: Jesus knows us fully and offers love and forgiveness unconditionally. In gratitude for the grace given to us and as a witness to our faith in Christ, we will love one another. The peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you.

People: And also with you.

Leader: Let us greet each other as we share our meal.

We will proceed with dinner at this point.
When you are finished with your meal, please clear your place.

²⁶ And during supper ³ Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands and that he had come from God and was going to God, ⁴ got up from supper, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. ⁵ Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. ⁶ He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" ⁷ Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." ⁸ Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." ⁹ Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" ¹⁰ Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you."

¹² After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had reclined again, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? ¹³ You call me Teacher and Lord, and you are right, for that is what I am. ¹⁴ So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. ¹⁵ For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you.

You are invited to wash each other's hands with a wipe and put used wipes in the bowl.




Prayer of Thanksgiving and the Lord's Prayer

Communion is served at table. Each table has a common loaf (gluten free), rice crackers, and a common cup of unfermented wine (juice). To serve each other, break a piece of bread off the loaf (or take a cracker) and offer it to your neighbor with the cup. To receive communion, take the bread (or cracker), and dip it in the cup, if you wish. Then serve your neighbor.

ONE: Today God makes common cause with our human suffering.


ALL: We read the Scriptures, sing the hymns, feel the feelings of the day Christ died.


